

# Eagles at 'Crossroads' Vs. Pottstown; Bishops Will 'Platoon' Lebanon

Roy Kent and his Norristown High School football troops figure they are at a crossroads this week, and have been drilling in anticipation of getting a green light.

It was at this point a year ago, after winning their first two games, 27-6 over Conshohocken and 26-7 over Phoenixville, that the Eagles were given a sudden jolt, 7-0, by Pottstown and spun to seven straight defeats.

The Eagles want this one badly, hoping to take a clean slate and a strong argument into next Friday's head-on clash with Lower Merion at Roosevelt Field.

When Bishop Kenrick High School returns to Roosevelt Field Friday night, the hallowed ground of their only victory, to host Lebanon Catholic, a combat assignment will be given to sophomore Pete Augustine and his aerial magic.

The Golden Knights are hoping the new starter will supply the spark that will break the spell of two consecutive defeats, the last of which was suffered Sunday at Atlantic City, as the locals fell prey to Holy Spirit High, 20-0.

Augustine tossed the pigskin literally all over the field at the Seashore Sunday in an effort to avert the shutout, but his receivers just didn't have the sticky fingers.
